Summary: The Commonwealth Fund 2001 Health Care Quality Survey sought to determine patients' perceptions of respect in the health care encounter and how patients' negative perceptions would influence health care utilization. This study was conducted as a telephone survey of 6722 adults who all had a regular doctor. Interviews were conducted in the language preferred by the respondent: English, Spanish, Mandarin, Cantonese, Vietnamese, or Korean. The survey revealed that racial and ethnic minorities were significantly more likely to report being treated with disrespect than were white patients: 14.1% of blacks, 19.4% of Hispanics and 20.2% of Asians perceived disrespect in the health care encounter compared with 9.4% of whites. The factors associated with perceived disrespect were: male gender, persons for whom English was not the primary language, and less than a college education. Respondents who reported being treated with disrespect were less likely to have had a physical exam in the prior year. Patients who thought they would have received better care had they been of another race were more likely to report not following the doctor's advice, and were also less likely to have received optimal chronic disease screening.
