

Chapter 4. Applications of Derivatives

4.7 Newton's Method

Note. In Newton's Method, we try to approximate an x -intercept of a graph. We use tangent lines to improve our approximations as follows:

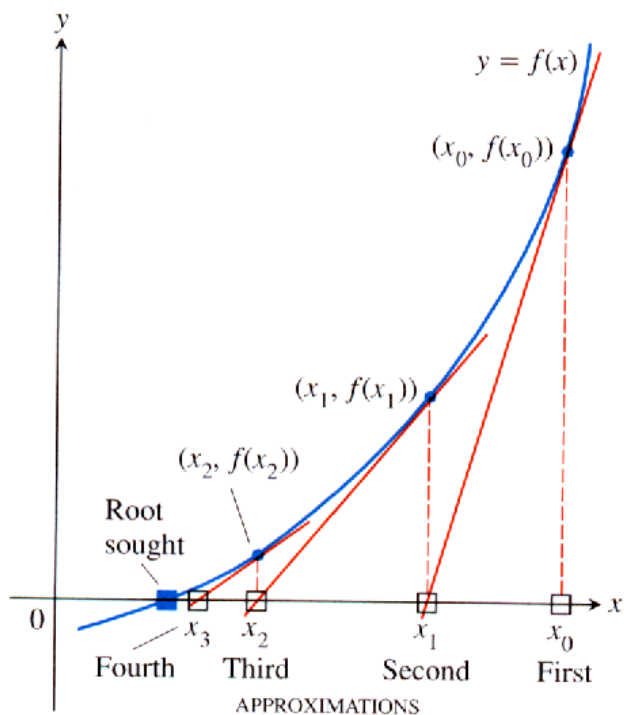


Figure 4.44, page 275

Note. Procedure for Newton's Method

1. Guess a first approximation to a solution of the equation $f(x) = 0$.
2. Use the first approximation to get a second, the second to get a third, and so on, using the formula

$$x_{n+1} = x_n - \frac{f(x_n)}{f'(x_n)}.$$

Note. The equation of the tangent line to $y = f(x)$ at $(x_n, f(x_n))$ is $y - f(x_n) = f'(x_n)(x - x_n)$. Therefore the intercept x_{n+1} satisfies

$$0 - f(x_n) = f'(x_n)(x_{n+1} - x_n)$$

$$\text{or } x_{n+1} = x_n - \frac{f(x_n)}{f'(x_n)}$$

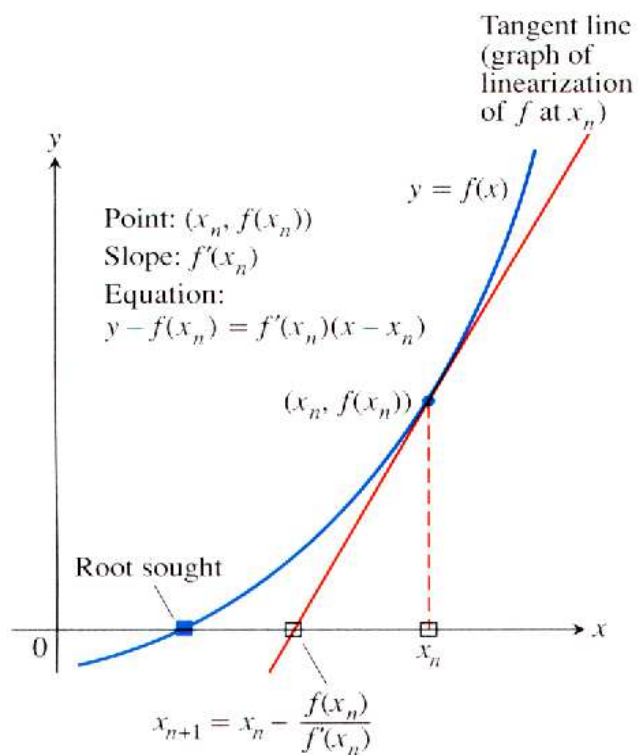


Figure 4.46, page 326 of 11th Edition
